

TIGHE'S HILL.

The anniversary of the Tighe's Hill Methodist Sunday School was celebrated yesterday, the services being attended by large congregations. Special provision had been made for the scholars, who acquitted themselves well in singing and reciting. Mr. H. Lavery preached in the morning, and Rev. A. M. Yates conducted the afternoon and evening services. Special hymns and anthems were sung by the choir and children. Mr. J. Shaw was conductor, and Miss Welford officiated at the organ.

Mr. Edward Reavley, who had lived in Tighe's Hill for thirty years, died suddenly on Thursday. The deceased gentleman was in his usual health up till noon on that day, when he collapsed while crossing the road in the front of the house. He was assisted by friends to his home, but died within an hour, the cause of death being heart failure. Although taking no active part in public affairs, he was held in very high esteem by a wide circle of friends. Until five years ago, when he retired into private life, the deceased was employed by the Hutton Coal Company, where he held the position of fan engine driver. Only a short time ago Mr. Reavley was presented by the Colliery Engine-drivers' Association with a silver-mounted umbrella, a smoker's outfit, and several other articles, as an evidence of the esteem in which he was held by that body. The funeral left the deceased's late residence on Friday afternoon, the remains being followed by a large number of relatives and personal friends, the interment being in the Methodist portion of the cemetery. Services were conducted at the house and the graveside by the Rev. A. M. Yates.
